The Risks and Ethical Gray Areas

The proliferation of these sites has not come without significant debate. Since these platforms operate outside of the main Steam community, they exist in a legal vacuum in numerous jurisdictions.

1. The Absence of Regulation

Unlike state-sanctioned casinos, offshore skin gambling websites are rarely audited for fairness. While lots of claim to utilize "Provably Fair" algorithms-- which permit users to confirm that a roll wasn't rigged-- there is no government oversight to make sure these programs are in fact operating as advertised.

2. Targeting Minors

Maybe the most significant ethical issue is the age group of the CS: GO player base.
