

Newton is one of those Massachusetts cities that reveals itself in layers. On a map it looks like a close-in Boston suburb, but spend any time there and it feels more like a collection of distinct village centers, old roads, preserved homes, and lived-in neighborhoods tied together by a strong civic identity.
