

A place that was never built to be hurried

Dix Hills has always had a certain restraint to it. That may sound like a strange way to describe a Long Island hamlet, but it is the first thing people notice once they spend time there. The roads are broader than in the older villages to the north and south, the homes sit back from the street, and the landscape still keeps some of the wooded character that once defined much of central Suffolk County.
