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A healthy septic system is a quiet partner. When it works, you hardly think about it. When it fails, you consider little else. A backup on a holiday weekend, a soaked spot over the drain field, a whiff of sulfur near the tank cover, these issues bring genuine costs and a reasonable amount of stress.
