- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has lawfully pressured prominent platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot far from utilizing Steam-related infrastructure.

Despite these steps, operators continue to adapt by making use of peer-to-peer marketplaces, alternative cryptocurrencies, and overseas licensing to keep their platforms running.
