

Jupiter has a way of getting under your skin. It is not just the ocean light or the steady breeze that comes off the Intracoastal, though those help. It is the sense that the town has managed to grow without losing its character. You can still feel traces of the place it once was, a working stretch of Florida where the river, the inlet, and the land around them shaped daily life. At the same time, Jupiter today is full of good restaurants, family neighborhoods, parks, and destinations that draw visitors back year after year.
