The Step-by-Step DIY Window and Door Tune-Up

1. Check and Replace Weatherstripping

Gradually, weatherstripping compresses and loses its bounce.

2. Lube Moving Parts

Squeaky hinges and stubborn moving tracks just need a little lubrication.

- **How to repair:** Avoid sticky oils like WD-40 on tracks, as they attract dust and dirt. Instead, use a silicone-based spray or graphite powder on tracks, hinges, and lock systems to make sure smooth operation.

3. Caulk Gaps Around Frames

Exterior spaces let water seep into walls, causing structural damage.

- **How to repair:** Scrape away old, broken exterior caulk. Apply a bead of state-of-the-art, paintable outside silicone-acrylic latex caulk along the frame joints, smoothing it out with a damp finger or caulking tool.

4. Change Door Hinges

Drooping doors typically have loose screws or a hinge that needs stress adjustment.

- **How to repair:** Tighten loose screws. If the holes are removed, remove the screw, insert a little piece of wood toothpick covered in wood glue into the hole, and re-insert the screw for a tight grip.
