

A weekend in Alto, Georgia, has a way of slowing the pace without putting life on pause. The town is small enough that you can hear the difference between a quiet Saturday morning and a busy weekday, but it is not the kind of place that feels stuck. There is a working rhythm here, shaped by family routines, churches, small businesses, older homes, and the practical concerns that come with maintaining buildings in a North Georgia climate that can turn on you quickly.
