Generally, users log into a gambling website utilizing their Steam qualifications. To deposit funds, gamers transfer CS2 skins from their Steam inventory to a bot managed by the gambling platform. The site then credits the user's account with internal currency or site coins. When players want to cash out, they use those coins to buy other skins from the site's bot inventory, which are then traded back to the gamer's Steam account.
