

Roof-related insulation can help address heat transfer at one of the building's most exposed surfaces. However, "roofing insulation" can describe several different applications, so the scope should be defined carefully.

A contractor should identify whether the project concerns insulation beneath the roof deck, another part of the roof assembly, or a spray foam roofing application. Existing roofing materials, drainage, penetrations, flashing, equipment, and surface condition can all affect what is appropriate.

An active roof leak should be investigated before insulation covers evidence of the problem. Similarly, damaged or unsuitable surfaces may need repair or preparation. Foam application does not eliminate the need for a properly designed and maintained **Click here for info** roofing system.

The proposal should state what surfaces will be treated, the material being used, the intended depth or application specification, and any coating or protective layer included in the scope. Property owners should also confirm who is responsible for preparing the roof, moving equipment, and completing future inspections or maintenance.

Roof assemblies involve interactions among insulation, air control, vapor behavior, drainage, and ventilation. For that reason, a recommendation should be based on the actual building rather than on a generalized promise about savings or service life.
