A virtual coin is flipped, and the winner takes the entire pot. 50/50 odds, minus a small platform commission (rake). **Prize** Several players contribute skins to a main pot. Each skin's value figures out the player's "ticket" share. A spinner picks one winner who takes everything. Based upon the total value contributed; platform takes a percentage fee.
