- **Day before your flight:** Pack your suit using your preferred method (we'll talk details below). Soft-prep anything else you'll wear with it to avoid buried wrinkles.
- **Morning of the flight:** Do a quick steam check (or touch-up with a steamer) before heading out—remember I always pack a steamer before shoes!
- **Boarding time:** Use carry-on strategies to ensure your suit stays on top and accessible, avoiding the overhead bin crush.

Writing these deadlines directly into your digital calendar is my #1 life hack—it turns a vague idea into guaranteed action.

Why You Should *Never* Check Your Suit

Whether you're flying economy or business class, the garment bag or suit in checked luggage is a gamble. Checked bags get tossed, humid environments and pressure can distort your suit, and lost luggage stories are all too common.

Carrying on your suit guarantees:

- **Control:** Your suit is in your hands, reducing the risk of damage or loss.
- **Accessibility:** Perfect for quick wrinkle inspection and emergencies like last-minute dry cleaning requests or touch-ups.
- **Stress reduction:** No waiting at baggage claim, no lost luggage anxiety.

Carry-On Tactics: Boarding Strategy & Packing Methods

How you pack and when you board are often overlooked but critical aspects to wrinkle-free suit travel.



Boarding Strategy

3. **Choose Your Seat Wisely:** A bulkhead seat or exit row often provide more storage space and room, ideal when carrying formalwear.

Packing Methods

4. **Fold Pants:** Fold the pants along the creases, then fold in half carefully, avoiding sharp creases that will be undesirable.
5. **Combine & Pack:** Stack the jacket on top of the pants. Place them carefully on top of any soft items in your garment duffel or carry-on bag—ideally packed on top.
6. **Use a Layered Buffer:** Place extra soft items like a scarf, ties, or a sweater on top of the suit for protection, and to lock it in place.
7. **Seal & Carry:** Zip your garment duffel closed and carry it as your primary carry-on. During boarding, prioritize stowing it in overhead bin space where it will lie flat and uncrushed.
