- **High-Risk, High-Reward:** Choosing expensive cases (like Operation cases or weapon cases with uncommon knives) leads to volatile battles where one lucky drop can turn the tide totally.
- **Low-Risk, Sustained Play:** Choosing less expensive cases permits more rounds, distributing the variance over a longer duration.

3. Playing Team Modes (2v2)

For players wanting to reduce threat, 2v2 modes share the burden of variance with a teammate, making the gameplay session last longer and offering a different tactical approach.
