- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00

Some skins look pristine even in Battle-Scarred condition, while others become unrecognizable. This includes another layer of RNG (Random Number Generation) to case openings, greatly affecting the market value of the dropped product.

The Economics of the Steam Community Market

The CS: GO economy runs on supply and need, mirroring standard financial markets. Valve sets the cost of secrets, however the rates of cases and skins are entirely player-driven.

Key Economic Factors:

- **Active vs. Rare Drop Pools:** Valve often turns cases into a "rare drop pool," considerably reducing their drop frequency. When a case ends up being uncommon, its supply decreases, triggering its cost on the Community Market to increase-- often from a couple of cents to tens of dollars.
- **The "Hype" Factor:** The release of significant video game updates, esports tournaments (Majors), or the launch of *Counter-Strike 2* traditionally sets off enormous spikes in player counts and case openings.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade 10 skins of the same rarity for 1 skin of the next higher rarity. This mechanic assists manage the supply of low-tier skins while incentivizing players to recycle undesirable products.

Popular Cases Through the Years

Over a decade, numerous cases have been launched. Some have actually achieved legendary status due to their renowned contents.



- **The Weapon Case (1 & 2):** The leaders of the system, consisting of traditional knives like the Karambit and M9 Bayonet. These command astronomical rates today.
- **The Chroma Case Series:** Introduced a few of the most lively and popular knife surfaces in the video game, such as Doppler, Marble Fade, and Tiger Tooth.
- **Prisma Case:** Known for introducing high-tier knife finishes combined with cost effective yet popular community-designed weapon skins.
