Use film to verify if a team's pressure rate is coming from a structural blitz or random breakdowns, or whether a receiver's route efficiency aligns with the offensive strategy rather than sporadic big plays.

How to Integrate Film Into Your Routine

Schedule your film study like a pro:

- Start by rewatching routine plays, not just highlights — the consistency matters most.
- Note key matchups and player responsibilities relevant to upcoming games.
- Track changes week to week, such as rising pass-rusher usage or shifts in secondary personnel.
- Layer your notes on pressure rates and matchup analytics to cross-validate observations.

Remember my old mantra when someone presents a hot take without film evidence: *"show me the snaps."* If you can't back it up visually, question it.

Analytics: Support, Not Replacement
