- **The 2016 Cease-and-Desist Era:** Valve sent formal notices to dozens of prominent gambling sites, requiring them to close down or modify their operations.
- **Trade Lock Implementations:** To suppress instant skin trading (which facilitated rapid gambling deposits), Valve introduced a 7-day trade hold on all newly traded products.
- **API Scam Mitigation:** Valve has continually updated its system to avoid automatic bots from facilitating unlawful transfers.

Regardless of these procedures, the industry has actually shown resistant. When one site closes, a number of others emerge, making use of cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT) along with or in location of direct skin deposits to bypass traditional Steam trade restrictions.
