4. **The Steam Community Market:** Once acquired, items get in a 7-day trade cooldown, after which gamers can purchase, offer, or trade them freely on the Steam Community Market.

The Economics of Rust Skins

Unlike numerous video games where cosmetic items are bound to a player's account forever, Rust skins have real-world liquidity by means of the Steam Wallet (and third-party markets, though care is recommended). Prices change based upon supply, demand, and total player count.
