

Brookline has a way of making its history feel present. You notice it in the brick façades along quiet streets, in the older triple-deckers that still anchor neighborhoods, and in the places where the town's past has been folded into daily life instead of frozen behind glass. Walk through Brookline with your eyes open and you start to see layers. A Victorian porch here. A stone retaining wall there. A granite stoop worn smooth by decades of shoes, snow, and salt. It is a town that has aged in public view, and that aging matters.

That is one reason foundation issues are such a practical concern here.
