

Amityville has a way of surprising people. Some know it only by name, usually because of the old haunting story that made the village famous far beyond Long Island. Others know it as a comfortable South Shore community with marinas, neighborhood blocks lined with mature trees, and a downtown that still feels human in scale. Both impressions are true, but neither tells the whole story.

What gives Amityville its character is the balance between history and daily life. It is a place where older homes sit beside updated storefronts, where the waterfront remains part of the local rhythm, and where residents care deeply about how their property looks and holds up over time.
