The Betting and Gaming Act 1960 was landmark legislation that effectively legalised betting shops and commercial bingo halls across the UK. It was intended to regulate and contain gambling within structured, licensed environments. Yet, one unintended outcome of this act was the rise—and later decline—of these physical spaces.

Many cinemas that were struggling to maintain audiences during the mid-20th century adapted by converting their spaces into bingo halls.
