The Five Wear Categories

To assist players understand the physical condition of a weapon at a glance, Valve categorized float worths into 5 unique tiers:



Condition Name	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with little to no visible scratches or use.
Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Very minor blemishes, generally just noticeable upon close examination.
Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear, scratches, and minor paint breaking on high-friction areas.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, fading colors, and prominent scratches.

Battle-Scarred (BS) 0.45-- 1.00 Heavily distressed, rusted, or scraped away, frequently providing the weapon a gritty, commercial appearance.

The CS2 Economy: Rarity Tiers

Skins are categorized into various rarity tiers, which determine their drop rates in-game or acquisition rates through weapon cases. Comprehending these tiers is vital for anybody looking to understand the marketplace worth of their stock.

- **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, basic weapon finishes, usually found in weekly gameplay drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less common than consumer grade, however still generally low-value.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** The standard baseline for the majority of collection and case skins.
- **Restricted (Purple):** Often forms the middle tier of case drops; visually striking and fairly priced.
- **Classified (Pink):** High-tier weapons that feature complex art work and command significant market attention.
- **Covert (Red):** The highest basic weapon tier, including the most popular rifle and SMG surfaces in the game.
- **Special Item (Gold/Exotic):** The rarest tier, encompassing knives and representative gloves.
