Common Medications Titrated in UK Psychiatry

In the UK, National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) standards suggest specific pharmacological treatments for ADHD.

- **Stimulant Medications:**

- *Methylphenidate* (e.g., Ritalin, Concerta XL, Medikinet)
- *Lisdexamfetamine* (e.g., Elvanse)
- *Dexamfetamine* (Amfexa)

- **Non-Stimulant Medications:**

- *Atomoxetine* (Strattera)
- *Guanfacine* (Intuniv-- more commonly used in children and teenagers)

Typical Titration Timeline for Stimulants

- **Week 1-- 2:** Starting dose (e.g., 30mg Elvanse or 18mg Concerta XL). Monitoring for sleep changes, cravings suppression, and high blood pressure.
- **Week 3-- 4:** First boost based on efficacy and side results.
- **Week 5-- 8:** Further modifications till an optimum restorative dosage is achieved.

5. What if my GP refuses the Shared Care Agreement?

If an NHS GP declines a Shared Care Agreement (which they deserve to do based on work or medical obligation), the personal center or Right to Choose service provider is typically responsible for continuing to recommend and monitor you, though personal prescription expenses may temporarily apply till alternative arrangements are made.
