Wear Condition	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine, perfect surface with very little to no scratches.
Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Extremely light wear, typically a couple of minor scuffs on close inspection.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious scratches and wear, but the artwork remains mainly undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Considerable wear, heavy scratches, and obvious paint fading.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Heavily distressed, rusted, or scraped; in some cases looked for after for unique appearances.

Beyond outside wear, skins can also have a **StatTrak**™ module (which tracks verified kills with that specific weapon, marked by a small digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports competitions, including gold team and event stickers).

The Economics of the Steam Marketplace and Third-Party Sites

The CS2 economy operates similar to a real-world stock exchange. Prices are determined completely by supply and demand, rarity, and neighborhood understanding.

Why Are Some Skins Worth Thousands of Dollars?

1. **Rarity:** Skins are categorized by tiers (Consumer, Industrial, Mil-Spec, Restricted, Classified, Covert, and Special/Exceedingly Rare). The drop rates for high-tier items, specifically knives and gloves, are infinitesimally small.

2. **Trade-Ups:** Players can trade in ten skins of a particular tier for one random skin of the next greater tier, burning valuable products at the same time and decreasing total supply.
3. **Pro Player Influence:** When a well-known esports professional uses a specific skin throughout a major competition, the rate of that skin frequently increases overnight.
4. **Drift Extremes:** Some collectors pay massive premiums for products with exceptionally low float worths (e.g., 0.000 x) or remarkably high floats where the gun looks totally rusted away (referred to as "Blackiiimovs" on the AWP Asiimov).

Popular Platforms for Trading and Buying

While players can buy and sell items directly on the main **Steam Community Market**, funds are locked within the Steam community and can not be squandered to a checking account. Subsequently, a robust third-party community has actually emerged.

- **Steam Community Market:** Safest for casual users; transactions utilize Steam Wallet funds.
- **Third-Party Marketplaces:** Platforms like Skinport, DMarket, and Buff allow users to buy skins with fiat currency or cryptocurrencies, and frequently feature cash-out options.
- **Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Trading Sites:** Sites where buyers and sellers trade straight without the bot holding the product for a compulsory trade-hold period.

The transition from Counter-Strike: Global Offensive to Counter-Strike 2 on the Source 2 engine brought huge visual overhauls. This straight affected how skins look in-game.

- **Sticker labels:** CS2 presented the capability to use as much as 5 sticker labels on any weapon and easily position and rotate them, causing amazing neighborhood customization.

- **Understand Liquidity:** Just because a skin is noted for £ 500 doesn't suggest it will sell quickly. High-tier collectibles take some time to offload, whereas Covert weapons and common knives are liquid properties that sell almost quickly.
- **Treat It Primarily as a Game:** While skin investing has shown profitable for some, updates from Valve (such as modifications to trading policies or container drops) can dramatically modify market price over night. Never ever invest cash you can not pay for to lose.
