Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious wear, scratches, and fading. This is the most common condition in the market.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear; paint is visibly broken and dull in major locations.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Heavy wear. The weapon looks greatly weathered, rusted, or damaged. (Note: Some skins look uniquely "cool" or "blackened-out" in high float BS).

It is worth keeping in mind that some skins are hardcoded to never ever appear in specific conditions. For instance, a specific skin may only exist in Factory New and Minimal Wear conditions.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

Skins are classified into different rarity tiers, which determine how hard they are to get through random case drops or trade-ups.

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental weapon surfaces.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less typical than consumer grade.
- **Mil-Spec Grade (Dark Blue):** The standard tier for the majority of weapon case drops.
- **Limited (Purple):** Noticeably rarer and often includes more complex artwork.
- **Classified (Pink):** Highly in-demand skins with complex styles.
- **Covert (Red):** The greatest standard weapon tier, featuring iconic designs like the *AK-47|Redline* or *M4A4|Shout* (Contraband).
- **Unique Rare (Gold):** Knives and Gloves. These are the rarest and most costly standard drops in the video game.
