Beyond outside wear, skins can likewise possess a **StatTrak™** module (which tracks validated eliminates with that specific weapon, marked by a small digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments, including gold team and occasion sticker labels).

4. **Float Extremes:** Some collectors pay massive premiums for products with incredibly low float worths (e.g., 0.000 x) or exceptionally high floats where the weapon looks totally rusted away (understood as "Blackiiimovs" on the AWP Asiimov).

Popular Platforms for Trading and Buying

While players can buy and sell items directly on the main **Steam Community Market**, funds are locked within the Steam ecosystem and can not be squandered to a savings account. Consequently, a robust third-party environment has actually emerged.
