1. **Production:** Community artists design skins using 3D modeling software and submit them to the Steam Workshop.
2. **Neighborhood Voting:** Players vote on their favorite styles, pressing popular items to the attention of designers.
3. **Selection:** Facepunch curates a weekly batch of accepted skins.
4. **The Item Store:** Every Thursday, a brand-new batch of skins is launched on the official Rust Item Store for a repaired, low rate (generally varying from £ 0.99 to £ 3.00).

As soon as bought from the official shop, these items have a one-week trade and market limitation. After that week, they enter the Steam Community Market, where supply and demand determine their true value.
