- **Trade Hold Implementations:** To decrease the rapid transfer of skins in between accounts, Valve introduced a seven-day trade hold on items traded from user inventories. This seriously interrupted the instant-deposit and instant-withdrawal designs that gambling sites trusted.

- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has legally pressured prominent platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot far from utilizing Steam-related infrastructure.

Despite these procedures, operators continue to adjust by using peer-to-peer markets, alternative cryptocurrencies, and overseas licensing to keep their platforms running.
