Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing recurring crashes, work through the following troubleshooting steps methodically.

1. Verify the Integrity of Game Files

Over time, game files can become damaged due to unanticipated system shutdowns, insufficient updates, or malfunctioning storage drives. Steam has a built-in tool to inspect and change missing out on or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and select **Properties**.
- Browse to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Wait for the process to surface (Steam will immediately download any corrupted files), then reboot your computer system.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or check out the main NVIDIA website to download the most recent Game Ready Driver.

- *Pro Tip:* If the crashes started instantly after a driver upgrade, use a tool like **Display Driver Uninstaller (DDU)** in Safe Mode to totally clean the old motorist before installing a steady, older version.

3. Change Launch Options

Specific launch options can require CS: GO to run in a more stable environment, bypassing intro videos or forcing specific DirectX modes.

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and select **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, look for **Launch Options**.
- Get in the following advised steady commands (separated by areas):

 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU priority)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

- Go to the **Compatibility** tab and check **Run this program as an administrator**.
- Click Apply and OK.

5. Check for Background Application Interference

Overlay software application and hardware tracking tools regularly hook into the DirectX pipeline of video games, which can trigger abrupt crashes. Attempt disabling the following applications while playing:

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party anti-viruses software (attempt adding an exemption for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If standard fixes stop working to fix the concern, the issue might lie much deeper within your operating system or hardware configuration.

1. Handling Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM offers a performance boost, CS: GO is notoriously conscious hardware instability.

- If you have used an aggressive overclock, attempt dialing it back to baseline factory specs.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is triggering the crashes.

2. Re-installing CS: GO Cleanly

In some cases, leftover custom-made maps, out-of-date workshop items, or heavily modified configuration files cause relentless disputes.



- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- By hand browse to the installation directory (... steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and delete any staying folders.
- Re-install a fresh copy of the game.

Preventative Maintenance Checklist

- **Keep Windows Updated:** Install the most recent cumulative updates for your os.
