

Farmingville sits in a part of Suffolk County that many people pass through without really seeing. That is a shame, because the community has a grounded, lived-in character that says a lot about central Long Island. It is not a resort town and it is not trying to be. Sealing, when appropriate, helps preserve the result. It can deepen color, protect against staining, reduce water absorption, and make future maintenance easier. It is not mandatory for every installation, and not every surface should be sealed immediately after cleaning. The decision depends on the material, age, and condition of the hardscape. That is where experience pays off.
