- **Step 4:** Go to the **Compatibility** tab.
- **Step 5:** Check package for **Disable fullscreen optimizations**.
- **Action 6:** Click *Apply* and *OKAY*.

Advanced Troubleshooting

If basic software application fixes fail to fix the crashing concern, the issue may lie much deeper within the os or hardware setup.

Managing Overclocks (CPU, GPU, and RAM)
