- **Prize:** Multiple gamers throw skins into a typical pot. A lottery-style wheel spins, and the total worth of the pot is granted to a single winner, with higher-value items increasing a gamer's relative share of the wheel.
- **Upgrader:** A risk-based video game where a player selects a skin they desire to win (worth more than their current skin) and rolls a wheel to see if they effectively upgrade.
