Popular Games Found on CS: GO Casino Sites

1. Live roulette

Instead of a conventional numbered wheel, CS: GO live roulette wheels are typically divided into 3 or 4 colored segments (typically red, black, and green/yellow). Players wager their skins or site balance on which color the wheel will arrive at, with certain colors using higher multipliers.

2. Crash

Crash is arguably the most popular video game mode native to crypto and eSports gambling. A multiplier starts at 1.00 x and increases quickly. Players should cash out before the graph "crashes." If the crash occurs before a gamer cashes out, they lose their bet. The stress and social element of watching the multiplier climb make this a fan favorite.

3. Coinflip

A straightforward 1v1 game mode. 2 players wager skins of roughly equal value. The system designates one player "Terrorist" and the other "Counter-Terrorist," flips a virtual coin, and the winner takes the whole pot (minus a little site commission, referred to as the rake).

4. Jackpot

Numerous gamers toss skins into a typical pot. The value of each player's skins determines their portion opportunity of winning the whole pool. A virtual spinner chooses the winner, suggesting a gamer who transferred a low-value skin still has an opportunity-- albeit a little one-- to win everything.

- Gift cards or virtual product markets
