The Mechanics Behind the Scenes: Provably Fair Gaming

To combat uncertainty and develop trust amongst users, reliable CSGO gambling sites execute a system referred to as **Provably Fair**.

This cryptographic technology enables gamers to individually confirm that the result of every video game is really random and has actually not been controlled by the house.

- **How it works:** Before a round begins, the server generates a secret "server seed" and hashes it, showing the hash to the player. The player's browser generates a "client seed." When integrated with a nonce (a counter), these 3 aspects determine the game result.
- **Verification:** After the round concludes, the unhashed server seed is exposed. Players can plug these variables into a verification tool to show the house didn't modify the result midway through.
