It is thought about a benign development of skin cells (specifically keratinocytes). Clinical research constantly reveals that these lesions do not typically proceed right into cancer malignancy or other skin cancers cells. The exact reason for seborrheic keratosis stays unknown. However, variables such as genetics, age, sun exposure, and hormonal changes are believed to add to its development. While anyone can develop seborrheic keratosis, it has a tendency to be a lot more typical in older individuals.

Seborrheic Keratoses start as barely raised, slightly bumpy, tiny plaques on the skin surface that may be either colored or otherwise tinted. In time, these turn into raised, warty plaques that appear as if "stuck on" to the skin surface, and are darkly pigmented or even black in darker individuals. These later developments may be anywhere from 1 to 6 cm, and hardly ever may be itchy or tender.

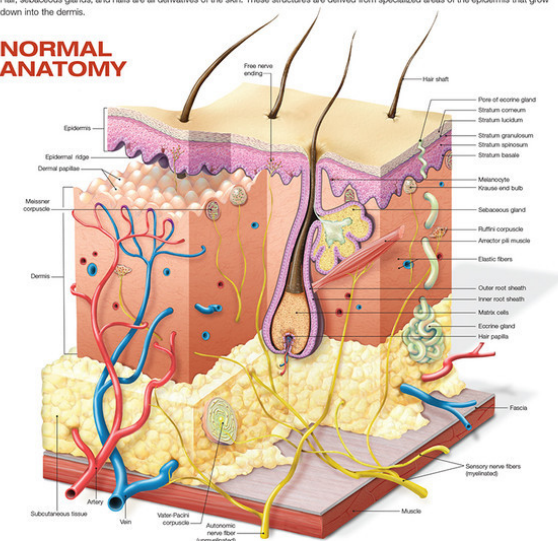
Seborrheic keratoses are safe and not contagious. They don't need treatment, but you may make a decision to have them eliminated if they come to be aggravated by clothing or you do not such as exactly how they look.

Common Lesions and Disorders of the Skin

The skin is the largest organ of the human body. The outermost layer, the **epidermis**, protects the body from injury, excessive water loss, and invasion by disease-causing microorganisms. The innermost layer, the **dermis**, contains blood vessels, glands, and nerve endings that respond to changes in temperature, pressure, and pain. Beneath the dermis lies a layer of subcutaneous tissue that contains adipose (fat) and connective tissue to cushion the body, maintain heat, and store energy.

Hair, sebaceous glands, and nails are all derivatives of the skin. These structures are derived from specialized areas of the epidermis that grow down into the dermis.

TYPES OF SKIN LESIONS

Common Benign Lesions

"Benign" means **"not cancerous."** It is sometimes difficult to tell whether a lesion is benign or cancer. A biopsy (examining tissue from the lesion under a microscope) is used to determine whether a lesion is cancerous.



A nevus is a benign pigmented lesion of the skin.

An angioma is a blood vessel growth commonly found on the skin.

A wart is a growth caused by the human papilloma virus.

Seborrheic keratoses are common benign growths that occur in adults.

Cysts are growths that form beneath the skin and sometimes drain onto the surface.

Dermatitis papulosa nigra are more common in darker skin and appear as small, raised, skin tag-like growths.

Common Malignant Lesions

"Malignant" means **"cancerous."** There are different types of skin cancer. Melanoma is the most serious. Skin cancers can appear depending on skin tone.

Lighter skin (Fitzpatrick types I to III)



Melanoma is a cancer of the pigmented cells of the skin called melanocytes. Melanoma can spread throughout the body, so early diagnosis and treatment are critical.

Basal cell carcinoma is the most common form of skin cancer. It commonly appears on sun-exposed skin. In people with dark skin, it may appear as a dark patch or nodule.

Squamous cell carcinoma is the second-most common form of skin cancer. It is caused by UV exposure.

Acne is caused by the blockage and inflammation of the pilosebaceous unit of the skin.

Atopic dermatitis (eczema) is a variety of conditions characterized by inflamed, itchy skin.

Alopecia areata is a patchy hair loss caused by an autoimmune response to the hair follicles.

Psoriasis is an inflammatory skin condition characterized by scaly plaques over the knees, elbows, and scalp.

Rosacea is a condition characterized by redness and inflammation of the central face.
