1. The Sticking Door

Humidity changes often cause wooden doors to swell, making them stick in their frames. Additionally, loose hinge screws can cause the door to droop.



- **Step 1:** Inspect the hinges. Tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes are stripped, get rid of the screws, insert wood glue and toothpicks into the holes, let dry, and re-insert the screws.

- **Step 2:** If the door still sticks, find the binding point by moving a notepad along the gap.
- **Action 3:** Sand or airplane the high spot down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to avoid wetness absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking hinge is a simple fix that yields instantaneous satisfaction.

- **Step 1:** Open the door and location a wedge underneath it for stability.
- **Action 2:** Tap the hinge pin upward utilizing a hammer and a nail or punch tool.
- **Step 3:** Clean the pin with a wire brush or rag, use a lubricant (such as white lithium grease, petroleum jelly, or silicone spray-- avoid cooking oils that attract dust), and tap the pin back into place.

3. A Loose or Misaligned Latch

When a door fails to remain shut, the latch bolt is likely missing out on the strike plate.

- **Action 1:** Apply lipstick to the lock bolt and close the door. The lipstick will leave a mark on the door frame, revealing where the latch is hitting.
- **Step 2:** Adjust the strike plate by unscrewing it and filing down the hole, or moving it a little up or down to align with the mark.

Common Window Issues and How to Fix Them

Windows are important for ventilation and natural light, however they are also main culprits for energy loss.

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts suggest abject weatherstripping or failed caulking around the window frame.

- **Action 1:** Inspect the outside border of the window. If the old caulk is split or missing out on, scrape it away, tidy the area, and use a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk.
- **Action 2:** For double-hung windows, change damaged V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to produce a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

- **Action 1:** Run an energy knife carefully around the perimeter of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.
- **Step 2:** Tap carefully along the frame with a rubber mallet to loosen up the wood or vinyl.
- **Step 3:** Clean the tracks thoroughly and use a silicone-based lubricant to assist the window move efficiently.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *in between* the two panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has actually stopped working. Regrettably, this generally needs replacing the glass system (IGU) rather than the whole window frame.
