The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Visible wear and scratches, balancing cost and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Substantial paint breaking and heavy wear patterns.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Heavily deteriorated, sometimes looking rusted, weathered, or nearly totally removed of paint.

Note: Certain skins-- such as the famous AWP|Asiimov-- do not spawn in Factory New condition, making their least expensive possible wear states exceptionally unusual and valuable.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital possessions operates likewise to a real-world stock exchange. Costs are dictated simply by supply and demand, affected by numerous key elements:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports expert starts using a particular skin during a major tournament, the demand for that product typically increases over night.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping particular older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins included within them-- decreases, causing rates to increase organically in time.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell 10 weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next greater tier, burning products out of circulation and permanently changing supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations present new thematic collections, temporarily flooding or shifting the focus of the market.
