Interestingly, the game did not gain extensive popularity in the West up until the early 20th century. A 1932 letter to *The Times* in London in-depth confusion over the rules of "zhot" (an Asian hand game), while a post in the *New York Tribune* in 1924 introduced the game to American readers as an approach used by Chinese citizens. By the mid-1900s, it had actually cemented itself in international pop culture.
