Multiple players deposit skins into a common pot. The overall value determines the "tickets" each player holds. A random draw selects one winner. Moderate (portion cost taken from the total pot)

How Transactions Work: Skins vs. Crypto

- **Steam API/ P2P Trading:**

- **Steam Account Security:** Logging into third-party sites by means of the Steam OpenID protocol requires watchfulness. Phishing sites regularly mimic popular gambling platforms to take API keys and hijack user stocks.
 - *Idea:* Never enter your Steam qualifications on a site you haven't thoroughly vetted, and constantly utilize Steam Guard Mobile Authenticator.
