One contractor talks confidently about cabling and crown thinning, another shrugs and states they will "take a little off the top." Insurance language sounds like a labyrinth. On the other hand, that leaning oak isn't waiting. The ideal choice can secure your home, your wallet, and your trees for several years. The incorrect one can saddle you with residential or commercial property damage, hazardous cuts, and a mess that lingers.
