

Remodel HVAC Cleaning: How It Benefits Your Home

Why remodel HVAC cleaning matters after any renovation

- Dust travels everywhere: Cutting, sanding, and drywall finishing release microscopic particles that don't settle easily. These particles flow into returns and supply registers, coating ductwork, evaporator coils, blower motors, and filters.

- Optional sealing and sanitation: If ducts are leaky or have microbial growth risks, sealing and EPA-registered disinfectant treatments may be recommended, especially in damp basements.

When to schedule remodel HVAC cleaning



- Immediately after major dust-producing work: Drywall sanding, flooring removal, tile cutting, or plastering are classic triggers for renovation air duct cleaning.
- Before you move in: New home duct cleaning or move-in duct cleaning ensures that any builder dust is removed before you occupy the space.

- Change filters frequently: During active construction, check filters weekly and swap them when visibly dirty.
- Schedule cleaning promptly: Aim to book builder air duct service within a week or two after final cleanup.
- Clear access points: Move furniture away from registers and provide access to the air handler, returns, and mechanical room to speed the process.

- **Keep up with housekeeping:** HEPA vacuuming and damp dusting help maintain results after move-in duct cleaning.

Q: How soon after construction should I schedule cleaning? A: As soon as punch-list work is complete. For new builds, new home duct cleaning or move-in duct cleaning is best before you occupy the home to avoid breathing lingering construction dust.

Q: How often should ducts be cleaned after a remodel? A: There's no one-size-fits-all interval, but after a remodel, a single thorough service followed by good filtration and maintenance **air cleaner duct new haven ct** is typically sufficient. Reassess if you notice dust, odors, or airflow issues.
