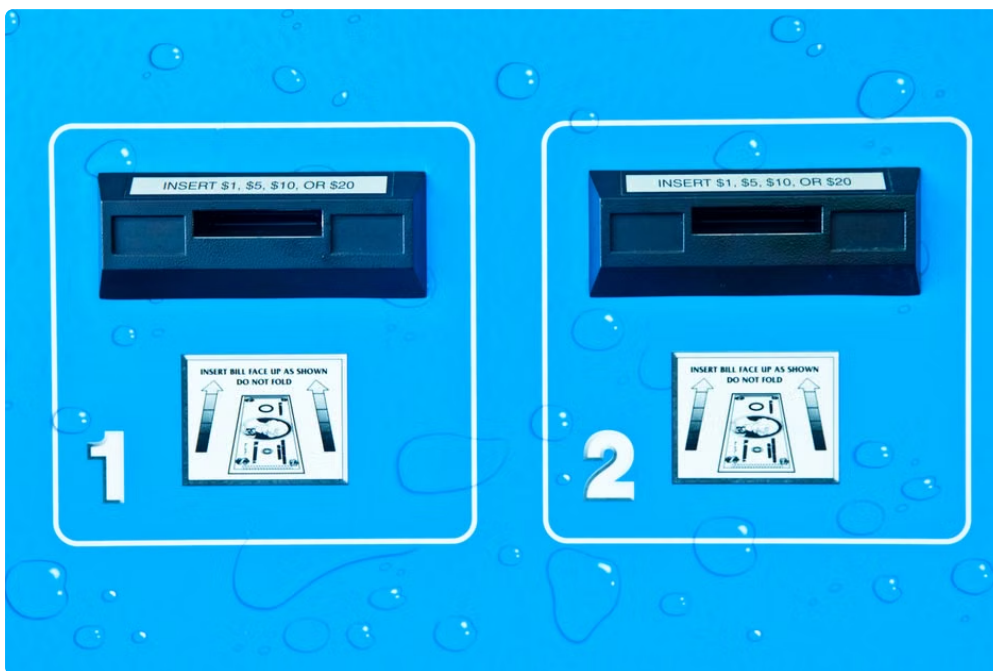
How Cluster Pays Work

- Winning clusters often trigger cascading or tumbling reels, where winning symbols disappear to make way for new ones.

What Stayed the Same and What Changed

What stayed the same: Symbols are still critical, and the basic goal is aligning specific icons to win.



What changed: The “line” concept becomes obsolete. Instead, winning is about position and adjacency on a dynamic board rather than a fixed pathway.

Automation and Payouts in Cluster Pays

While electromechanical machines used mechanical linkages and hoppers, modern cluster pays are fully digital, relying on RNG software for outcomes and ticket printing or electronic credits for payouts.



Clusters can lead to bigger, more frequent wins compared to traditional paylines because multiple clusters can form simultaneously, and cascading wins multiply player chances in a single spin.

Megaways: The King of Unpredictable Ways to Win

Introduced by Big Time Gaming in 2016, Megaways slots disrupted the classic slot layout by changing the number of symbols per reel on every spin, leading to hundreds of thousands of potential ways to win.

How Megaways Works

- The number of symbols on each reel varies randomly each spin, typically between 2 and 7 symbols.
- Winning lines are calculated by multiplying the visible symbols on each reel, creating an enormous number of ways to win.
- Lines are not fixed paylines but dynamic paths determined by symbol count and position.

Automation via Modern Tech

Megaways slots depend completely on RNG and software logic rather than physical mechanisms. The random reel heights each spin mean no mechanical setup can determine an outcome ahead of time, ensuring fairness and vast payoff possibilities.

Iconography Evolved

Since Megaways reels can display more symbols than traditional three-row setups, designers often move away from classic fruit icons toward thematic symbols fitting the game’s narrative—dragons, vikings, jewels, etc. However, the nostalgic sound design and flashing lights often remain as nods to the old days.
