Typical Door Issues and How to Fix Them

1. The Sticking Door

Humidity modifications typically cause wooden doors to swell, making them stick in their frames. Alternatively, loose hinge screws can cause the door to droop.

- **Step 1:** Inspect the hinges. Tighten any loose screws. If the screw holes are removed, remove the screws, insert wood glue and toothpicks into the holes, let dry, and re-insert the screws.
- **Action 2:** If the door still sticks, find the binding point by moving a piece of paper along the space.
- **Step 3:** Sand or aircraft the high spot down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to avoid moisture absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking hinge is a simple repair that yields pleasure principle.

- **Action 1:** Open the door and location a wedge below it for stability.
- **Step 2:** Tap the hinge pin up utilizing a hammer and a nail or punch tool.
- **Action 3:** Clean the pin with a wire brush or rag, apply a lubricant (such as white lithium grease, petroleum jelly, or silicone spray-- prevent cooking oils that bring in dust), and tap the pin back into location.

3. A Loose or Misaligned Latch

When a door stops working to remain shut, the lock bolt is most likely missing out on the strike plate.

- **Action 1:** Apply lipstick to the lock bolt and close the door. The lipstick will leave a mark on the door frame, showing where the latch is hitting.
- **Step 2:** Adjust the strike plate by unscrewing it and submitting down the hole, or moving it a little up or down to line up with the mark.

Common Window Issues and How to Fix Them

Windows are crucial for ventilation and natural light, however they are also main offenders for energy loss.

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts suggest abject weatherstripping or failed caulking around the window frame.

- **Step 1:** Inspect the outside border of the window. If the old caulk is split or missing out on, scrape it away, tidy the location, and apply a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk.
- **Action 2:** For double-hung windows, replace worn-out V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to create a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

Paint buildup or dirt tracks can glue a window shut.

- **Action 1:** Run an utility knife carefully around the boundary of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.
- **Step 2:** Tap carefully along the frame with a rubber mallet to loosen the wood or vinyl.
- **Step 3:** Clean the tracks completely and apply a silicone-based lube to assist the window slide efficiently.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *between* the 2 panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has actually stopped working. Sadly, this typically needs changing the glass system (IGU) rather than the entire window frame.

4. Why will not my sliding glass door slide efficiently?

Particles, animal hair, and dirt typically build up in the bottom track, causing the door to jam. Vacuum the track completely, clean it with warm soapy water, and apply a silicone lubricant. If the door still struggles, the rollers underneath the door may require modification or replacement.
