Common Variations of Case Battles

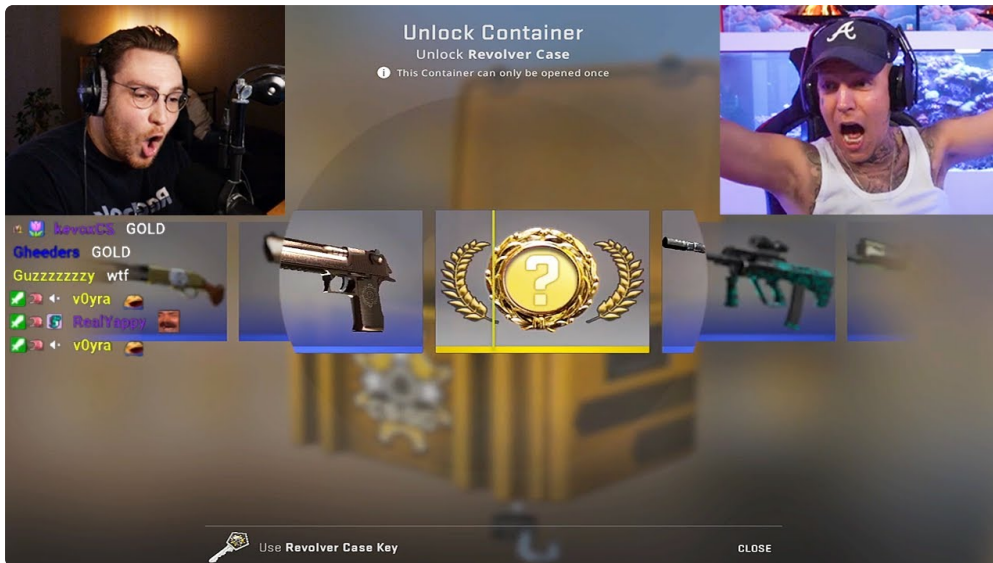
