Common Window Issues and How to Address Them

1. Drafts and Air Leaks

If a room feels cold regardless of the heating being on, air is most likely leaking around the window frame.

- **The Fix:** Inspect the caulking and weatherstripping. Old, cracked caulk should be scraped away and changed with a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone. Used weatherstripping can simply be peeled off and substituted with new adhesive foam or V-strip seals.

2. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

Double-paned (insulated) glass systems count on a tight seal and gas fill to insulate the home. When the seal stops working, moisture gets trapped in between the glass panes, producing an irreversible fog.

- **The Fix:** Unfortunately, defogging kits are generally a temporary cosmetic fix. The most effective option is to replace the insulated glass system (IGU) while keeping the existing window frame undamaged.

3. Stuck Windows

Painted-shut windows or windows jammed by dirt and inflamed wood frames can be discouraging.

- **The Fix:** For painted windows, carefully run an energy knife along the paint seal. For wooden windows swollen by humidity, avoid requiring them; instead, apply a silicone-based lubricant or await drier weather before planning to plane down the edges.

Typical Door Issues and How to Address Them

Doors take a pounding from continuous opening, closing, slamming, and shifting foundations.

1. Sticking or Sagging Doors

A door that drags on the floor or declines to lock appropriately generally has loose hinges or has actually shifted in addition to the home's foundation.

- **The Fix:** Open the door and inspect the hinge screws. Tighten up any loose screws. If the door still droops, changing one or more short hinge screws with longer 3-inch screws that bite deep into the framing stud can pull the door back into alignment.

2. Damaged Door Jambs and Thresholds

Rot at the bottom of an exterior door frame is a common concern caused by rainwater pooling on the threshold.

- **The Fix:** For small rot, scrape away the decayed wood, treat it with wood hardener, and fill the space with outside wood filler. For serious rot, cutting out the damaged section and splicing in a new piece of rot-resistant wood (or replacing the jamb totally) is needed.

- **Inspect Weather Seals:** Close a dollar bill in the door or window. If you can pull it out easily without any resistance, the seal is compromised and needs modification or replacement.
- **Clear Drainage Weeps:** Ensure that the weep holes on the outside bottom of moving doors and windows are clear of particles to avoid water from supporting indoors.

4. How typically should exterior caulking be changed?

Premium outside silicone or polyurethane caulking normally lasts in between 5 to 10 years. However, its life expectancy depends greatly on the home's climate and direct exposure to severe sunshine and extreme temperature levels. Check caulking each year and spot or replace as needed.
