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A healthy septic system is a quiet partner. When it works, you hardly think of it. When it fails, you think of little else. A backup on a vacation weekend, a soaked spot over the drain field, a whiff of sulfur near the tank lid, these issues carry real expenses and a reasonable quantity of tension. When the combined layers approach 30 to 40 percent of the tank's liquid depth, it is time to set up pumping.

What it costs and how to budget without surprises
