- **Consistency:** Using metaphors maintains brand continuity across real and virtual products.

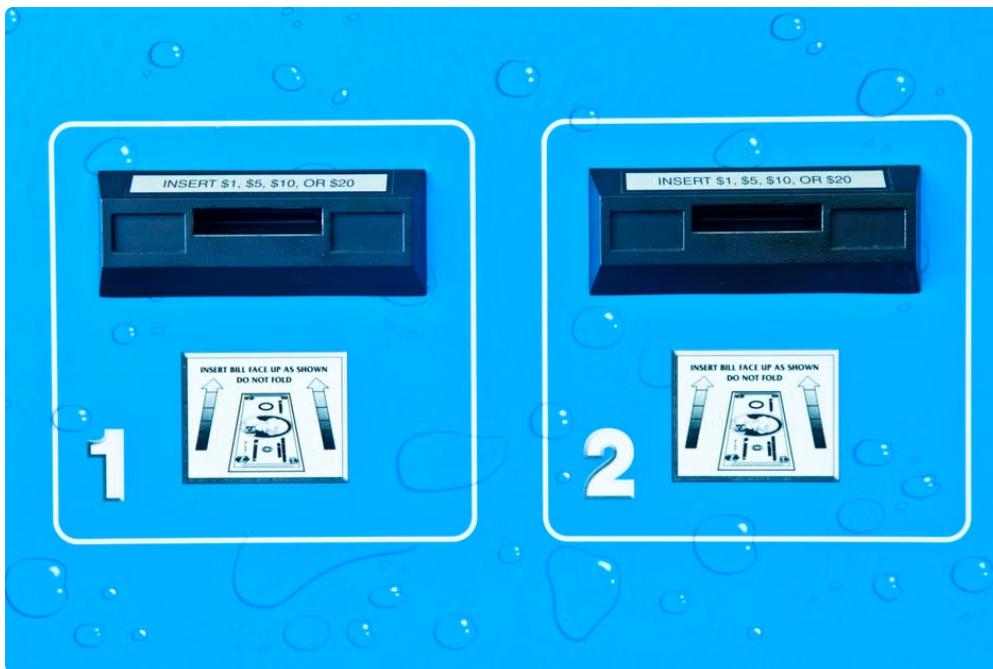
