- **Prize:** Multiple players discard skins into a communal pot. A winner is drawn arbitrarily, with higher-value contributions granting a statistically higher chance of winning the entire swimming pool.

4. Valve's Crackdowns

Valve, the developer of Counter-Strike, has repeatedly attempted to curb skin gambling. The company has provided prevalent cease-and-desist letters to popular gambling operators, withdrawn API secrets utilized by automated wagering bots, and carried out trade cooldowns (e.g., requiring traded items to remain in an inventory for 7 days) to interfere with the fluid motion of gambling assets.
