Coinflip	A straightforward 1v1 PvP video game where 2 players wager skins of approximately equal value. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the entire pot. 50/50 odds, minus a little platform commission (rake).	
Jackpot	Multiple players contribute skins to a central pot. Each skin's worth identifies the player's "ticket" share. A spinner picks one winner who takes whatever. Based upon the total value contributed; platform takes a percentage charge.
