What Does Pennsylvania Winter Actually Do to Heating Systems?

Pennsylvania winter stresses heating equipment because cold snaps, damp air, freeze-thaw cycles, and older housing stock force furnaces, boilers, and heat pumps to operate under changing loads. In Spring House and surrounding Montgomery County communities, that strain is especially noticeable in homes built before modern insulation, duct sealing, and ventilation standards became common.

January and February bring the highest number of heating failures because systems are running for long cycles during polar vortex events and sustained sub-freezing nights. A gas furnace that seemed acceptable in November may suddenly short-cycle in a February cold spell. Short-cycling means the equipment turns on and off too frequently, preventing the home from reaching stable comfort while increasing wear on ignition parts, blower motors, and heat exchangers.

AFUE (Annual Fuel Utilization Efficiency) is the percentage of fuel a furnace converts into usable heat, with standard furnaces often rated around 80% and high-efficiency models reaching 95% or more. In practical terms, a lower-AFUE furnace in a drafty 1960s split-level near Ambler can burn more fuel while still leaving rooms uneven. A higher-efficiency system only delivers its rated performance when it is correctly sized, vented, maintained, and paired with adequate ductwork.
