

Washington, Illinois, is the kind of place people often pass through without realizing how much it has to offer. That is a mistake I have seen many times. On the surface, it looks like a quiet Central Illinois community with neat neighborhoods, local shops, and a comfortable pace that feels a world away from bigger cities. Spend a little time here, though, and the city starts to reveal a deeper character.
